


Letter from the Supervisor

In addition to being hot and dry, it's also been a very busy summer here at Town Hall. The Town Board has filled several vacancies with new employees, including new Building Inspector/Fire Marshal Chad Fabry. In addition to serving the needs of Hamlin, Chad also serves as the Building Inspector for the Town of Clarkson. This collaboration of services between the two towns stands to save Hamlin taxpayers thousands of dollars per year, while still retaining full time availability for the Building Inspector. The Building Department is open from 8:30 am to 2:30 pm Monday through Friday and closed from 12:00 to 12:30 for lunch. Special accommodations can be made for certain inspections or appointments to meet your needs when arranged in advance. Please call 964-8181 for details.

Also new to our Town staff is Dog Control Officer Dave Maynard. Dave, a Hamlin resident, previously served as Hamlin's Assistant Dog Control Officer. When the opportunity to advance came up, Dave applied for the job and was interviewed by the Town Board. At the June 11th meeting, the Town Board unanimously voted to appoint Dave to the position of Hamlin Dog Control Officer. The number for Hamlin Dog Control is 525-1608.

Finally, upon the retirement of our long time Clerk to the Assessor Marcia Prince, the Town Board appointed Elizabeth Spencer to fill the position. Liz, another Hamlin resident, is very likely to be the first face you see when visiting the Assessor's Office at Town Hall. The phone number for the Assessor's Office is 964-8748 and they are open from 8:00 am to 4:00 pm Monday through Friday.

I welcome these new employees to our faithful staff of Town employees, who are here, ready to serve you.

As summer turns to fall, the Town Board will be busy with the 2013 budget process. This process requires several workshops, followed by a public hearing where you, the residents, are able to provide input to the Town Board on where and how your tax dollars are spent. Following the public hearing, the budget is put to a Town Board vote, which requires a simple majority to be adopted. Budget meetings will be scheduled after this edition of the Hamlin Express goes to print, so please check the Suburban News (Hamlin Herald), or www.hamlinny.org for information on the date and time of upcoming budget meetings.

At the August monthly business meeting, the Hamlin Town Board took the time to award Resolutions of Appreciation to two Hamlin servicemen, brothers, Brian and Scott Wortman, who both serve in the United States Army.



NYS Dog Licensing

New York State Law requires all dogs 4 months of age and older to be licensed and to have their license renewed each year.

Rabies Vaccination: Town of Hamlin requires all dogs 4 months of age and older to receive a primary vaccination against rabies (good for 1 year), and to receive re-vaccinations or booster vaccinations every three years for the life of the dog.



News from the Highway Superintendent

Winter will be here before the next newsletter. Just a reminder that we do accidentally hit some mailboxes while plowing. If yours should be hit, please call the Highway Department and we will replace it with a new rural steel mailbox.

The Highway Department offers an area outside of our fenced yard where people drop off brush and can pick up wood chips. Sadly some people also leave garbage, stone, and concrete. They hide this under the brush when they drop it off. If we don't notice this, the stones and concrete get in the brush chipper and break it. So far this year, we have probably picked up at least a 20 yard dumpster full of junk from out back. Please help us stop this and report things to the Highway Department if you see them. We want to keep offering this service. Thank you for your help.

FALL CLEAN UP

Town Residents will be allowed to bring their own items to 4180 Brick Schoolhouse Road (Transfer Station) beginning Saturday, September 22 through Sunday, September 30, 2012. Weekday hours are from 10 am-6:30 pm, and weekend hours are 8 am-4 pm.

There will also be dumpsters available for recycling at our Fall cleanup. You will need to separate the paper, glass, and metal and put in the appropriate dumpster. The Town of Hamlin will NOT ACCEPT any garbage, stones, concrete, paint cans, or hazardous waste items. We accept propane cylinders and car batteries. Any items containing a gas tank must have the gas tank removed before we will accept it. All gas tanks or drums must be clean, empty, and cut in half before we will accept them.

We will be collecting "e-waste" which will be recycled by SunnKing in Brockport. The NYS Electronic Equipment Recycling and Reuse Act mandates FREE collection of electronic equipment. Below is a listing of the items we will collect.

These items must be paid for at the Town Clerk's Office before taking them to the Transfer Station. The Town Clerk's Office is open 8 am-4 pm, Monday through Friday. We accept cash, check, money order, Master Card, Visa, or Discover.

BRUSH PICK-UP

The Town of Hamlin will be doing the Fall Brush Pick-up beginning October 22nd through October 26th.

- * The Brush has to be cut into lengths of 8 feet or less.
- * Please pile the brush parallel with the road.
- * Please Do Not include any type of lumber.
- * Please Do Not intertwine piles.
- * Brush has to be on the side of the road by October 22nd.
- * Leaves will only be picked up in paper bags.



The Town will ONLY make ONE pass down each road.



Hamlin CCC/POW History Trail Update (2012)

Volunteers from Hamlin and the surrounding area have been working since June 2008 to clear the “jungle-like growth” from the old Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) Camp on Moscow Road. The campsite is on property that is part of Hamlin Beach State Park and is located just east of the southern entrance to the park. By August of 2012, over 5000 people hours of volunteer work had been put in with hand tools cutting and hauling away the dense brush that had taken over the area. Today the eight acre site looks very much like a park and the work continues.

The CCC camp opened in 1935 and was part of a program instituted by the Roosevelt administration to provide relief from the effects of the Great Depression. Healthy young men from needy families could enlist in the CCC, a paramilitary organization, and they agreed to work for \$30 a month. They got to keep \$5 each month and the other \$25 was sent home to their families. The 1600+ CCC camps in the country were each assigned meaningful tasks that were designed to be investments in the infrastructure of the nation. (E.g. The government actually got something for the money it appeared to be giving away.) The Moscow Road CCC camp was outfitted to house 200 enlistees and given the task of turning a rather plain and small county park into the beautiful state park that presently sits on the site.

The young men were fed, clothed, and provided with educational and recreational opportunities that actually improved the health of the enlistees and boosted their self esteem. The local economies of the communities hosting the camps also improved. In 1941, however, as U.S. manufacturing increased to help supply our allies with war material, CCC enrollment decreased significantly and the camps closed.

Our camp had an extended life. Sometime after 1941 the education building, two large garages, the blacksmith shop, the tool repair shop, and an assortment of storage buildings were removed from our camp but the rest of the camp was left pretty much intact. When the need soon developed to provide housing for migrant workers imported from the Bahamas, our camp was easy to make ready for duty again! When the migrant workers moved out after the 1943 fall harvest, Italian prisoners of war moved in to take their place. However, Italy became our ally a couple of months later and the Italians had to be sent home. But we had a plan B.

Early in 1944, the camp was modified to accommodate German prisoners of war. An eight foot high barbed wire fence was erected around most of the camp, guard towers were put in place, the enclosed area was lighted, and a sturdy double gate controlled supply truck traffic into and out of the POW compound. The CCC cots were replaced with double bunks so that the five barracks would now hold 400 men.

The first German POWs arrived in Hamlin on June 30, 1944. For a year and a half, the prison population fluctuated with the seasonal labor demands of the local farmers and the area food processing plants. In the fall of 1945, a population record was set and seventeen tents had to be pitched behind the barracks for over a month to handle a total of 452 prisoners. The Hamlin POW camp closed on January 11, 1946.

Sometime after that, every building on the site disappeared as if they had been “beamed up.” The sewer system was made inoperable and the water service was disrupted and buried. Nothing was ever built over the site, crops were never planted on the site and no roads were ever built through the site. Nature had free reign and 70 years of runaway plant growth took over the site. The words “nothing is left of the Hamlin CCC camp” appeared in print several times in the recent past and that helped to keep visitors away from the site.

In June of 2008, Park Manager Marty Howden asked for help to turn the site into a history trail because of the role the camp played in getting us through the depression years and the war. When we started pushing aside the fallen trees and lopping the tangled brush and invasive species, it soon became apparent that there was, contrary to the newspaper stories, “lots of stuff” left of the site to see! There is a power pole they forgot to take down (with wires on it), broken and unbroken dishes, a bushel of hair tonic, shampoo and mouthwash bottles, cement stoops marking the front and back doors of the barracks, dents in the ground wherever a building sat, the cement work that allowed the saw mill to function, hardware of all kinds, half pint milk bottles and jam jars, prison yard light pole anchors from the POW era, an aluminum cup a POW “borrowed” from a canning factory, indoor plumbing hookups for the three “privileged” buildings that had that luxury, a futuristic (for the 1930s) chlorinated sewer system, the cement floor of the shower and wash room (all drains still working), a 24 foot long cement privy toilet pit that was once a “sixteen holer,” the entire buried bottom strand of barbed wire that surrounded the camp, coils of barbed wire someone forgot to pick up when the camp was dismantled, POW issue beer bottles, the cement floors of the only two truck bays in a thirteen bay garage that were paved (complete with functioning catch basin), the cement floor of the new POW shower room/wash room that was built after the other one burned to the ground, the cement foundations of the POW camp’s swinging gates, and lots of neat stuff we can’t put names to yet.

So far, we’ve marked the exact locations of 18 buildings and scraped clean over 2800 square feet of cement that used to be the floor of a huge tool building and blacksmith shop. We’ve even uncovered the cement floor of a “mystery building.” While we work, please feel free to visit and walk around the site. The volunteer workers you might run into are prepared to provide you with an aerial photo map of the site so you can give yourself a history tour.

We desperately need old photos showing what the camp looked like during the POW era. If you know of any, please notify someone at the State Park Office.

I'm from the government, I'm here to help.

Even though most consider that statement an oxymoron, the building inspector and the permit process are there to protect you, as are the requirements for contractors to carry liability and Worker's Compensation insurance.

The liability insurance requirement is there for the time the contractor's ladder falls on your new Silverado. The Workers Compensation requirement protects you when the contractor's employee falls from the roof. I'm not sure who pays if the employee falls on the Silverado, but it won't be you. While having insurance does not prove the contractor is competent or capable, it does at least ensure that he or she is serious about being in business. People that are serious about being in business typically want to satisfy their customers.

Another thing the code provides is a standard for construction; pretty much all code exists because someone was hurt (or worse) or a building failed- the following bit is off the first page of the residential code:

This code is intended to provide minimum requirements to safeguard public safety, health and general welfare through affordability, structural strength, means of egress facilities, stability, sanitation, light and ventilation, energy conservation and safety to life and property from fire and other hazards attributed to the built environment.

It is easier, safer and often cheaper to do things right. The code sets a minimum standard that creates a guideline for you or your builder. So you don't have to wade through reams of code, we have documents in the office that will help you build a compliant deck, install a pool, build safe stairs and landings and more. No charge.

- Obtain a permit. We'll help you through that process with an easy-to-understand application.
- Call for scheduled inspections - the Building Department exists to help ensure that your project is compliant.
- Research your contractor- referrals from friends and families are a great place to start your search.

Finally, I promise to make the whole process as quick and painless as is possible. If you have questions about your project or proposed improvements, I'm happy to help (short of carrying tools).

From the Conservation Board



The reality of the Emerald Ash Borer may soon be with us. The EAB has arrived in Chili, Henrietta, and other areas mostly south of Rochester, but experts say it's only a matter of time before it arrives in Hamlin. Hamlin is developing a response plan to deal with this problem with input from the Hamlin Conservation Board. The Conservation Board is also represented on the Monroe County EAB Task Force.

If you suspect an EAB on an Ash tree on your property, you should take a picture of it. You can take the picture or the actual beetle to the County's Cornell Cooperative Extension in Rochester to make a positive ID. They can also help you make decisions about protecting your trees from the EAB. Other sources of information are the State Department of Environmental Conservation at 1-866-460-0652 or the Hamlin Public Library which has information developed by the Monroe County EAB Task Force.
