



As many of you may already know, I will be retiring at the end of the year. My last day will be December 29th after almost 37 years with the Town of Hamlin Highway Department. I started in 1973 when Highway Superintendent Fred Leverenz asked me to join the department. I worked for Fred until 1978 when David Rose became the Superintendent. I was an equipment operator from 1973 until 1986 when Dave promoted me to Deputy Highway Superintendent. I had that title until 2002 when I became the Superintendent.

As I reflect back on my career at the highway department, there have been a number of changes in both the town and the different functions of the highway department. I believe we have become more service oriented over the years with things such as trash and recycling, brush pickup and mulch, hazardous material drop-off and even with our snow operations. Now with people going to work all hours of the day and night, many of the towns had to go with more of a 24-hour snow operation. We now have many more products available to use to help us maintain the roads in the summer and winter and many different kinds of equipment to do our job more efficiently. When I started, we had no park areas or recreation activities, now we have 100 acres of park and recreational facilities to maintain.

As I close, I would like to thank all of the residents I have had contact with over the years. This job is about working with and helping the residents when we can to solve their problems. It has been a pleasure to serve you. I would like to thank all the different people I have worked with from the various town boards, supports, town clerk, accounting department, recreation department and all the other departments of the town. I enjoyed working with all of you. Lastly, I would like to thank my employees. I appreciate your hard work and working with the residents of the town. You made it so much easier for me to do my job.

In closing, I would like to wish Steve Baase, the new Superintendent-Elect good luck in his new endeavor. I know the residents of the town are in good hands with Steve as their Superintendent of Highways.

WINTER TIPS FROM THE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

For your safety and well being during inclement weather, you should reduce your speed and drive according to the highway conditions. Winter driving conditions with icy and snow covered roads require more driving care. If your vehicle becomes stranded, contact the Monroe County Sheriff's Department at 911; they will notify the appropriate Highway department.

SNOW REMOVAL

The law regarding the depositing of snow on highways and shoulders is as follows: "Section 1219 of the Vehicle and Traffic Law and Section 214 of the Highway Law of New York State" specifically prohibit the placing or leaving of snow, ice or other substance upon any highway (which includes pavement, shoulders and ditches). As a result, should these practices occur, Police Agencies will be notified of such occurrence(s) with the intent that summonses will be issued to the responsible person or persons.

MAILBOXES DAMAGED DURING SNOW REMOVAL


During and after significant snow storms, the Highway Department, in the course of plowing, receives phone calls regarding damage to mailboxes, either from snow plows directly or from the force of snow being thrown by the plows. If such damage is indeed caused by snow removal, it is not done intentionally but is an unfortunate consequence of snow removal.

As far as the highway department replacing damaged mailboxes, it must be pointed out that there is no statutory or legal authority which grants a property owner or resident along a public highway any right to place a mailbox in a highway right-of-way. That the mailbox is on town, county, or state right of way is a courtesy to the postal service. Thus, when the necessity of keeping highways open, conflicts with the individuals reception of the mail, the latter must stand aside. The owner might even be compelled to remove the box under Highway Law #319.

From past experience, we have found that plastic mail boxes do not withstand the abuse of snow from the plows hitting them and are not recommended. Please check your mailbox for possible repairs. If your mailbox is damaged because of a rotten post or rusted box, the town will not repair it. As a courtesy, the Highway Department will place a temporary box so that a resident can receive mail if their box is damaged by the plow but we will not replace any fancy mailbox or box. Mailbox posts with fancy supports are not recommended as they stick down under the box and give the wing plow something to get hold of. A standard box mounted directly on top of a treated 4 x 4 is the best and that is what we will put up. Please note illustrations below.

HAMLIN CCC/POW HISTORY TRAIL UPDATE

Volunteers from Hamlin and the surrounding area have been working since June 2008 to clear the “jungle growth” from the old Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) Camp on Moscow Road. By the end of June 2009, over 2000 people-hours of volunteer work had been put in and the work will continue indefinitely. The site is on the property that is part of Hamlin Beach State Park and is located just east of the southern entrance to the park.

The CCC camp opened in 1935 and was part of a program instituted by the Roosevelt administration to provide relief from the effects of the Great Depression. Healthy young men from needy families could enlist in the CCC, a paramilitary organization, and they agreed to work for \$30 a month. They got to keep \$5 each month and the other \$25 was sent home to their families. The 1600+ CCC camps in the country were each assigned meaningful tasks that were designed to be investments in the infrastructure of the nation. (e.g. The government actually got something for the money they appeared to be giving away.) The Moscow Road CCC camp was given the task of turning a rather plain and small county park into the beautiful state park that presently sits on the site.

The young men were fed, clothed, and provided with educational and recreational opportunities that actually improved the health of the enlistees and boosted their self esteem. The local economies of the communities hosting the camps also improved. In 1941, however, as U.S. manufacturing increased to help supply our allies with war material, CCC enrollment decreased significantly and the camps closed.

Our camp had an extended life. By the end of 1941 and the beginning of 1942, the education building, the saw mill, garages, and storage buildings had been removed from our camp but the rest of the camp was left pretty much intact. When the need soon developed to provide housing for migrant workers imported from the Bahamas, our camp was easy to make ready for duty again! When the migrant workers moved out, prisoners of war moved in. The last POW's left near the end of 1946.

Sometime after that, every building on the site disappeared as if they had been “beamed up”. The sewer system was made inoperable and the water service was disrupted and buried. Nothing was ever built over the site, nothing was ever planted on the site and no roads were ever built through the site. Nature had free reign and 70 years of runaway plant growth took over the site. To keep visitors away, the words “nothing is left of the Hamlin CCC camp” appeared in print several times in the recent past!

In June 2008, Park Manager Marty Howden asked for help to turn the site into a history trail because of the role the camp played in getting us through the depression years and the war. When we started pushing aside the fallen trees and lopping the tangled brush and invasive species, it soon became apparent that there was, contrary to the newspaper stories, “lots of stuff” left of the site to see! There is a power pole they forgot to take down (with wires on it), broken and unbroken dishes, a bushel of hair tonic, shampoo and mouthwash bottles, cement stoops marking the front and back doors of the barracks, dents in the ground wherever a building sat, hardware of all kinds, half pint milk bottles and jam jars, prison yard light pole anchors from the POW era, indoor plumbing hookups for the three “privileged” buildings that had it, a futuristic (for the 1930's) chlorinated sewer system, the cement floor of the shower and wash room (all drains still working), a 24 foot long cement privy toilet pit that was once a “ten-holer”, POW issue beer bottles, the cement floors of the only two truck bays in a thirteen bay garage that were paved (complete with functioning catch basin), the cement floor of the new POW shower room/wash room that was built after the other one burned to the ground, and lots of neat stuff we can't put names to yet.

So far, we've marked the exact locations of 18 buildings and are currently moving debris so we can scrape clean over 2800 square feet of cement that used to be the floor of a huge tool building and blacksmith shop. While we work, please feel free to visit and walk around the site. The volunteer workers you might run into are prepared to provide you with an aerial photo map of the site so you can give yourself a history tour.

We desperately need old photos showing what the camp looked like during the POW era. If you know of any, please notify the Town Clerk's office. While you are there, ask the Town Clerk how you can get a DVD field trip of the camp showing what is being done there and what it looked like back in the 1930's.

Tips from the Conservation Board

SAVE \$ BY DEFEATING ENERGY VAMPIRES

You've gone to bed, turned everything off, the house is dark, ...except for those small, sinister red and blue eyes glaring at you in the night. Some are disguised as glowing apparitions in the darkness. Others are so well hidden that you're never aware of their costly presence. These Energy Vampires add a Phantom Load to your home's electric bill, costing you between 10 and 20% more each day, week, month and year. Be conservative. Figure just what 10% of your monthly bill is and multiply that times 12. Annually, that's a lot of wasted dollars! Here's how to defeat these vampires; but first let's identify the enemy.

Most often the enemy displays a small red, blue or green light such as your computer, printer, scanner, monitor, TV, DVD, VCR or CD player. Gaming systems, cell phone chargers, fax machines, power tools or small appliances, and any device that uses a remote, or is referred to as “instant on” for convenience, can be included in this list. While each of these glowing, red-eyed vampires suck relatively little “stand-by” energy alone in the OFF mode, when added together these phantoms silently drain your wallet and have been doing so for years. Most modern ovens, dishwashers, washers and dryers are also vampires, but these are hard-wired and we must learn to tolerate their presence in our homes.

A typical Hamlin household has 40 vampires sucking those hard-earned dollars out of your wallet. The thirstiest are your cable box and sometimes companion DVR, but these, like your digital clocks or coffee makers and microwaves with clocks, are very bothersome to reboot or reset when you plug them in again. You can't defeat every vampire, so choose your battles wisely. For convenience, cluster your enemies together, plug them into a “smart” power strip (one that doesn't use energy when it's turned off) and just kill them by the flip of a single switch at night, when leaving for work and/or school, or when going away on vacation. The cost of a few, well-situated power strips will quickly be recouped by your energy dollar savings, and you'll continue to reap those dollar savings over the years to come.

According to Hamlin Town Code, **NO** unregistered or junk vehicles are allowed to be stored on your property. This is any vehicle that does not have valid NYS license plates on it. A vehicle storage permit can be obtained to restore old or antique cars. This permit is valid for one year only and the cost is \$25.00. You can apply for a vehicle storage permit in the Building Department if you own the property, have the vehicle title and ID number for the vehicle. LET IT SNOW!!!

Just a reminder from the Fire Marshal to have your chimney cleaned before you use it for the first time this winter.

IT'S COLD OUTSIDE



Just a reminder from the Hamlin Building Department that all new wood burning, pellet, gas stoves and fireplaces that are installed in your home require a permit and need to be inspected before use. Solid fuel burning appliances are not allowed in the garage. This is for safety reasons and for insurance purposes. The cost of the permit is \$35.00. If you have any other questions please call the Building Department at 964-8181. The Building Department is open Monday through Friday 8:30am-2:30pm.



BUILDING PERMITS

A building permit is required in the Town of Hamlin for a shed, fence, pool, deck, addition, garage, pole barn, gazebo, pond, wood burning stove, emergency generator and sign, just to name a few. Re-roofing requires a permit when a tear off occurs. A dumpster must be onsite before the work begins. The cost of a permit is \$10.00. Failure to obtain a Building Permit is subject to a \$125.00 fee plus the cost of the permit.
